Some of the Duties of a doctor

- Patients must be able to trust doctors with their lives and their health.
- Your first concern is the care of your patient
- Protection and promotion of the health of patients and public
- Keep skills and knowledge up to date
- Recognise and work within limits of competence
- Work with colleagues in the ways that best serve patients' interests

You are personally accountable for your professional practice and must always be prepared to justify your decisions and actions.

HIV in 2012

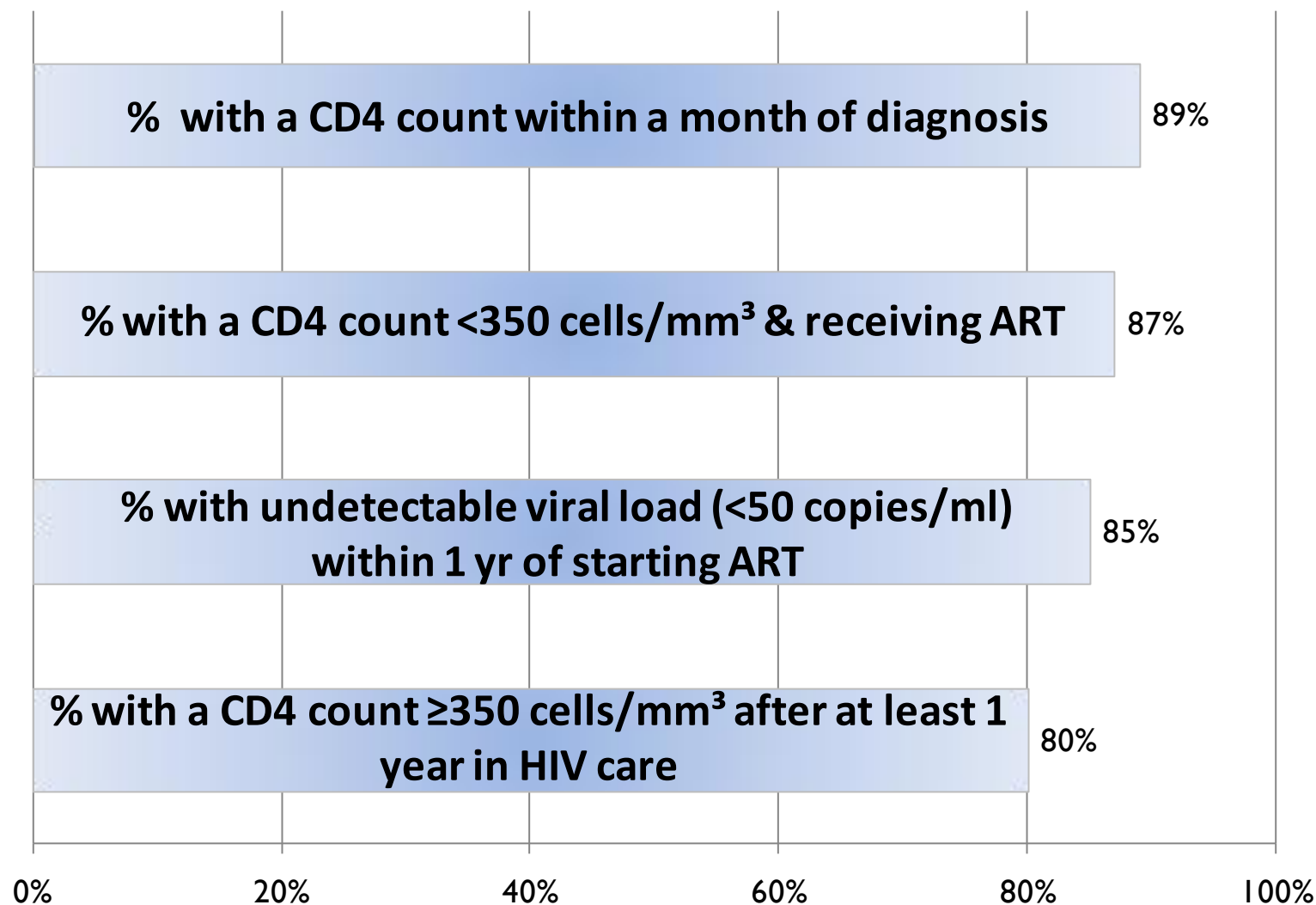
- Diversification of the epidemic

Clinical approaches

- Timely diagnosis
- Reduce illness
- Increase life expectancy
- Reduce infectiousness
- Suppress viral replication
- Restore / maintain immune function
- Avoid drug resistance
- Minimise unwanted effects
